He was unable to get back to the American lines Monday night, so he stood guard over them until the attack this morning liberated him and secured the prisoners to the Americans. Licut. Irving W. Wood, of Oakland, Cal, said he did not see one Ameri-can fall during to-day's attack. "It was more exciting than a foot-ball game," he added. "We have got more Americans and then we shall lick them." 
