The audience frequently interrupted the Senator to applaud his sentiments. He was Representative Julius Kahn, of California."

"The present war is the greatest of all wars and it must be fought out until it is won. We are more and more realizing that this war was not waged primarily for the making of the world safe for democracy, aithough it was waged for that, too; that it was not entered to save Belgium, although it was fought for that, too; that it was not entered to save Belgium, although it was fought for that, too; that it was not entered into to give to the small states the right to govern themselves, and it was fow for that too. Primarily, it was a war to save American ideals. "Germany autocracy must becrushed and we must never permit a peace negotiated by the Kaiser. He knows no law, human or divine. We cannot think of peace until the German people themselves take such measures as will control their own government.

"A man without a country in America is a man who is a grafter, even if his ancestors fought in the Revolutionary war. He is without a country if he votes against the best interests of this country.

"Some people of alleged high ideals would withdraw our troops and stop the war. They tried this in Russia. Any Socialist in the United States who knows this and is not willing to fight this war in every particular is not a good American."


