

PARIS OBJECTIVE POINT OF TEUTON DRIVE, REVEALED

Huns Unmistakably Unfold Strategic Intention in Attempt to Advance West

Paris, June 1.—The military critics, says a Havas Agency review to-day, still view the situation as seriously, but consider the signs increasingly reassuring. The most important development is regarded as the enemy's attempt to advance westward and push toward Paris, thus, it is considered, revealing his strategic intentions unmistakably.

It is pointed out, the allies were obliged to give ground in some places, but they held their own on the Alsne and the Oureq, and their vigorous counter-attacks are considered a prelude to the stoppage of the enemy advance.

At present the most important part of the battlefield is that with the Noyon region to the south of it on the one end and the district north of Chateau Thierry on the Marne on the other. It is here that the German rush towards Paris demands undivided attention.

Premier's Paper Optimistic The newspaper L'Homme Libre, Premier Clemenceau's organ, is optimistic to-day over the situation. It points out that the enemy plan to draw the allies towards the south and to push on westward only met with success as far as the first part of it was concerned. The remainder of the plan is being completely defeated, it declares, and everything gives reason to believe the enemy will be totally blocked.

There was much satisfaction over the news that the German advance had been stopped.

Drive Will Slow Down, Germany Tells Pope

Zurich, June 1.—Newspapers in Southern Germany publish the following note from the German headquarters: "The population should not expect our advance to continue at the same rate as on the first day. The resistance of the enemy is becoming desperate and violent counterattacks are to be expected. The transport of artillery and munitions also is meeting with some difficulty."

12,500 MORE MEN CALLED FOR JUNE

Washington, June 1.—A call for 24,674 draft registrants of grammar school education to be sent to special training schools, was issued to-day by Provost Marshal General Crowder. The men will be taken from 38 states.

Special Calls This statement regarding the special calls was issued: 320 to report to the commanding officer at the University of Pittsburgh for instruction as auto mechanics and sheet metal workers;

412 to report to the commanding officer at Lafayette College for instruction as telegraphers, auto repairmen, blacksmiths, instrument repairmen, welders, carpenters, pattern makers, millwrights and electricians;

464 to report to the commanding officer at the University of Pittsburgh for instruction as auto mechanics and sheet metal workers;

361 to report to the commanding officer at Lafayette College for instruction as blacksmiths, bench workers, carpenters, auto mechanics, locomotive engineers and machinists;

296 to report to the commanding officer at Pennsylvania State College for instruction as electricians, carpenters, machinists and blacksmiths.

Only white men and men physically qualified for general military service are to be furnished under these calls. The men selected for this service will receive a course of training at Government expense fitting them to serve in Army positions incident to their military service, both at the front and behind the lines. The men taking these courses will receive thorough instruction, which will be of great personal value in working their way ahead both in the Army and in civil life. These are exceptional opportunities for energetic, ambitious men. Qualified registrants are urged to present themselves to their local boards for voluntary induction. When registrants voluntarily present themselves local boards may induct qualified men upon receiving permission from this office. The voluntary period will continue until June 7. After June 7 no more volunteers will be accepted. If on June 8 a sufficient number of volunteers has not come forth to fill the allotment, local boards will be instructed to select in sequence of order numbers a sufficient number of qualified men from within Class I to fill these calls.

Only white men who have completed at least a grammar school education and who have had some experience along mechanical work may be inducted. For mechanical work may be inducted. Each man must carry with him at least two suits of undereclothing, one suit of outer clothing in good condition, a sweater, a stout pair of shoes, three extra pairs of socks and two bath towels, as he will be kept in civilian clothing during the first three weeks until he can be supplied with a uniform and other clothing."

Patients in Munich Hospitals in Revolt

Amsterdam, June 1.—Drastic methods employed by the German medical authorities in treating nervous patients in military hospitals in Munich resulted in revolts by the patients in which wards were wrecked, according to the Koelnische Volkszeitung. At Rosenheim, the hospital was burned by the rebellious patients. The papers add that electric shocks of such strength are employed that the patients scream in terror.

ITALIAN SHIP OF 8,261 GROSS TONS REPORTED SUNK New York, June 1.—Word was received here yesterday in marine circles that the Italian steamship Verona, 8,261 tons gross, registered at Genoa, had been sunk by a German submarine. Officials here of the Navigazione Generale Italiana Line, owners of the ship, said they had received no official confirmation of the report. The vessel was in the service of the Italian government. The sinking is said to have taken place last week.

DR. LAVERY ENTERS ARMY

Riots on the increase in All Parts of Bohemia; Kohlin Defies Austrians

London, June 1.—(British admiralty per Wireless Press).—Riots and internal disorders of all kinds are increased in Bohemia. A Vienna newspaper says that what is happening to-day in Bohemia resembles the Lombard and Venetian uprisings of 1848, except that to-day the empire is being strangled by an enemy in a war from which she does not see a way of escape.

At Chosen, crowds, exasperated by police brutality, set fire to barracks and to the city hall, where the mounted police were lodged. Eight of the policemen were burned to death.

At Kolín, the people pulled down the Austrian and raised the Bohemian flag. Public buildings have been burned at Tabor and other towns in Bohemia, and in Olmutz, Moravia. At Prague, the offices of the German newspapers were sacked.

The Prague correspondent of the Stuttgart "Neueste Nachrichten" telegraphed to his newspaper that the events of last Sunday at Prague exceeded in gravity all the previous demonstrations.

The Croatian press reports that martial law has been proclaimed in Bohemia. It has occurred in various towns, and that the Italo-Slav entente is daily becoming stronger.

PROSPECT IS FOR SPLENDID CROP

Similar plants, however, are thriving exceedingly well. Dauphin county's yield of strawberries this year will be unsurpassed by those of any recent years.

Unripened cherries cluster the trees in large numbers, but many of them are affected with the brown rot as a result of the extremely wet weather of this year. As a consequence, while now the trees are much fuller than ordinarily are, much of the fruit will be lost.

High-grown peaches in Dauphin county give promising indications, but the low-grown product is a decided failure. The late snows killed practically all the buds and young fruit of the trees. However, a fair crop is in store for the county, although it will be somewhat below normal. The crop of pears is expected to reach normal.

With the American Army in France, June 1.—Another German plane was brought down this morning by an American pilot in an air battle, crashing near St. Mihiel, in the sector northwest of Toul, according to unofficial information.

Aaron Leading For Fourth Place Now

Unofficial returns from the Republican primary with exception of some districts in Allegheny, Elk and a few small districts in other counties show the following standing of the candidates for the four nominations for Congress-at-large: Garland, 208,224; Crago, 197,761; Walters, 193,003; Aaron, 191,721; Berks, 189,987; McLaughlin, 168,729; Robins, 130,201.

It will probably take the official count to settle who is the Democratic nominee for lieutenant governor. It is believed that J. Washington Logue will withdraw if nominated.

The Philadelphia Record to-day says there will be "complete harmony between Judge Bonniwell and McCormick and Palmer whose domination of the party machinery the Judge took away because the people willed it. The Record tells of visits paid to the rival camps by Robert S. Bright, and says:

"It is practically certain that the next Democratic state chairman will not be a resident of Philadelphia nor Allegheny counties. The suggestion has been made that he should be chosen from among the leading Democrats of such counties as Lehigh, Berks and Northampton. Incidentally, Judge Bonniwell received big majorities in these three counties."

"Coincident with the visit of Mr. Bright to Judge Bonniwell's office, a letter was received by the Democratic party of state. I want you to know very promptly that so far as I am concerned the fight is over. The will of the majority of the Democratic party is, of course, the court of last resort as affecting my political action. I shall do everything I can to see that the entire ticket has the full cooperation of the Democratic party of state."

Mr. Guffey has not yet congratulated his successful opponent, nor has Mr. McCormick been heard from. Mr. Bright, however, is known to have carried the message to Judge Bonniwell that the defeated candidate and Mr. McCormick would be active in supporting him."
