

108 NAMES ON WAR FRONT LIST OF CASUALTIES

Twelve Pennsylvanians on Long Roster of Killed and Wounded. Washington, June 8.—The Army casualty list today contained 108 names, divided as follows: Killed in action, thirty; died of wounds, ten; died of airplane accident, four; died of accidents and other causes, six; died of disease, six; wounded severely, thirty-five; wounded, degree undetermined, seventeen.
