They smile when they ensure the trenches, they smile when they charge, and when they return for rest from the heat of battle, still they smile. Never do they complain, but always are they eager to be unleashed for the fray. Their officers complain only of their overanxiety to get into the fight. Their dash and enthusiasm has startled the wearied French and British into a renewed liveliness, and they know they will win."
