"Over the Top" Is Coming to the Victoria

Manager James George, of the Victoria Theater, has secured the scoop of years in motion pictures by obtaining "Over the Top," the Vitagraph special in which Sergeant Arthur Guy Empey, author of the famous book, appears in the leading role. "Over the Top," Empey's own story, will be shown at the Victoria for four days, beginning Monday, June 17. At the same time the people of Enola will welcome Major William B. Gray, Engineer R. C., constructing quarter-master in charge of the work at the Ordnance Depot near Middletown. He started this busy town and this will be his first visit since the great work on the famous classification yards was started.

With Major Gray on this visit will be Mrs. Gray, Captain Lewis E. Moore, Captain Harrie A. Douglas, Lieutenant Edward Avery, of Major Gray's staff; E. V. Matland, supervising engineer on the big work at Middletown; C. E. Pollard, field auditor; Riley Williams, traffic manager, and others who are important factors in government work.

General Secretary S. G. Hepford, of Enola Y. M. C. A., and one of the busiest men on the Pennsy system, will make an address and tell some interesting facts about the boys at the front. Mrs. H. G. Huber will tell about the work at Enola, and there will be other short addresses.

Miss Mary Butler will sing "The Rose-rose Dell," by Strauss, and "You Land and My Land," the words of which were written by Mrs. Gertrude M. Rohrer, of Pittsburgh. FRENCH ATTACK TRAPS 50,000; SLAUGHTER HUNS

Density of German Troops Fatal in Face of Accurate Aim

With the French Army in France, June 13.—On a width of battlefield 3,000 yards in extent no fewer than four German divisions (more than 50,000 men) were preparing to hit a hard blow when the French launched a highly successful counterattack southeast of Montdidier. The density of the German troops was fatal for them because the Entente artillery, machine guns, riflemen and aviators were able to aim at point-blank range into these masses of men. This concentrated fire did terrible execution.

An entire division of the famous Jaegers was cut to pieces at Rezonville, while a Guards division lost a great proportion of its effectiveness. Other divisions, it is learned, suffered equally during the preparation for the attack and the advance to the narrow valleys, all the passes of which were dominated by the Allied guns.
