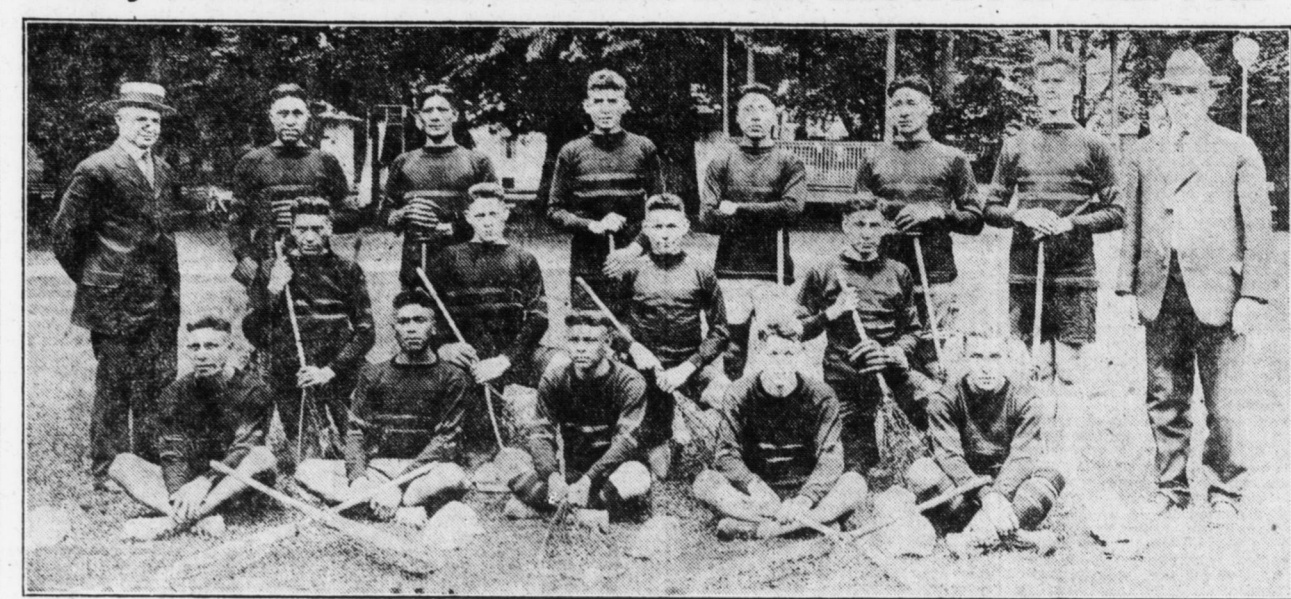

Carlisle, June 14.—With the most successful lacrosse season in years and good results in the track and field schedules, the Carlisle Indian School has closed its athletic program with the annual interclass meet and games, a feature of the fortieth annual commencement.

The lacrosse men lost but one game, that to the Navy by a small score, and totaled over seven times as many goals as their opponents. The team this year was a good one, developed for the most part from green material by W. T. O'Neill, the famous Canadian coach.

BLUE RIDGE LEAGUE QUILTS

Lack of Interest, Poor Playing, Bad Business, Given as Reasons

Poof! Up goes the Blue Ridge League to-morrow. It started in 1915 with six clubs most promisingly. In giving the reason for busting up at this time the management says that the main reason for the downfall lies in a disagreement over the guarantee money for each game. It is known that in several instances the guarantee was not paid the visiting teams. Hagerstown proved the best money-getter in the league, the

highest income from a single game there being \$143. Cumberland, although the league-leaders, never drew any higher than \$39 and Piedmont and Martinsburg did still worse. Piedmont's greatest receipts for any game are estimated at \$60 and Martinsburg at \$40.

The lowness of the receipts can be attributed to two causes, "general lack of interest in sports" and the inferior grade of ball being played. On the other hand are advanced expenses for everything with an added hardship in the advance in railroad rates. Less income and greater expenditure were a combination under which the league could do naught else but what it did—go to smash.

NEWCOMB OF PHILADELPHIA IS NOW TRAPSHOOTING CHAMPION

Lancaster, Pa., June 13.—Charles H. Newcomb, the independent gun club star of Philadelphia, added more honors to his remarkable shooting career by winning the Interstate Association amateur championship of Pennsylvania at the state tournament this afternoon.

The shooting grounds, swept by a treacherous wind that tossed the targets about like straw, made Newcomb's performance of 97 strokes in 100 the more meritorious when it is noted that Roy McIntyre, last year's champion, with one hundred straight broke only 92 and Allen Hill, the 1916 champion, also with 100 straight, broke only 92. Newcomb now has the opportunity of being the winner of the national championship a second time, a feat heretofore not accomplished.

In the morning event at seventy targets, H. A. Morson, of Charlotte, N. C., surprised the gallery by breaking 72, the wind blowing a gale. He won the trophy for the event.

On the State championship event H. E. Hernon, Lock Haven, broke 96, while M. B. Stewart, of Harrisburg, got a 95, winning second and third trophies. Newcomb, besides winning the championship trophy,
