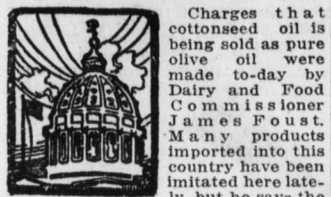


COTTON SEED OIL FOR OLIVE OIL

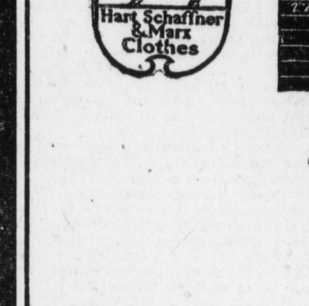
