Market Street Baptist Endeavorers invite all C. E.'s and friends to the service on Sunday evening. Henry Palm will have charge of the meet-ing.



Dedication of Keshet Israel Synagogue to Be Impressive



The beautiful new Keshet Israel Synagogue at Capital and Briggs streets will be dedicated with appro-priate ceremonies to-morrow. The services will be conducted under the supervision of Rabbi Silver and the principal address will be delivered by the Rev. H. Masliansky, of New York, one of the most eloquent of Jewish orators. During the afternoon Rabbi D. Lavinthal, chief rabbi of Philadel-phia, will be one of the speakers. In addition to the addresses of these dis-tinguished ecclesiastical orators, Josef Rosenblatt, the celebrated cantor-tenor, accompanied by a choir of five of the best voices from his synagogue in New York, will sing a number of selections. The congregation will assemble at the old synagogue, Fourth and State streets, at 10 o'clock in the morning and after the preliminary ceremonies will proceed in a body to the new synagogue, where the major part of the exercises of the day will take place. In the evening a sacred concert will be held in the main auditorium, to which admittance can be had by ticket only. The program will in-clude several solos by Josef Rosen-blatt and selections in which he will include religious, operatic and patri-otic selections. This special feature is anticipated with much pleasure by those who are familiar with Cantor Rosenblatt's standing in the musical world. His reputation is interna-tional and he is considered by many critics the peer of the greatest living tenors. His records put out by the manufacturers of phonographic mu-sical instruments have added won-derfully to his reputation and have created a desire on the part of many local admirers to hear him person-ally. The new Keshet Israel Synagogue is architecturally artistic and modern in design and appointment. It is 50x70 feet in dimensions and is built of light buff brick, trimmed with white stone. Commodious vestibules lead to two auditoriums, one on the first floor, used for daily worship and Sunday school, and to the main meet-ing room on the second floor, used for worship on the Sabbath and for im-portant services at other times. This room is beautifully finished and fur-nished. The ark and pulpits, espe-cially designed and artistically carved, are finished in white enamel and gold. The ceilings and walls are beautifully stenciled and frescoed. Magnificent leaded art glass windows further embellish the decorative scheme. Each of these windows is designed in rich and harmonious col-ors to illustrate some particularly epoch or historical event in the Jew-ish religion. Several domes have been built into the ceiling and are lighted with fixtures that fit in with a very pleas-ing architectural effect. The pews are of heavy fumed oak and the other furnishings are of elegant and artistic character. A large bal-cony adds materially to the seating capacity of the main auditorium. There are also reception rooms, li-brary, lavatories and other modern conveniences for the comfort and convenience of the congregation and visitors. A large basement will be fitted up for a gymnasium. The lighting system is specially designed, by which a combination of direct and indirect systems is used to excellent advantage. The new structure has been carefully and strongly built. It has also been tastefully adorned and furnished. "You gave me a new idea of Jesus," said one of the best-known Bible students of the city. "This new setting started my mind running in a new channel." To-morrow night it is expected that there will be many more people attend. Arrangements are being made for more seats. "I shall not be sur-prised if more than a thousand peo-ple come to the service," said the pastor. "We will do our best to ac-commodate them. If they can't find seats there is plenty of standing room."

Interesting Subject For Mrs. John Y. Boyd Class




