### **ANTI-LOAFING BILL REGARDED** AS FARCICAL

Justice Simpson, State Supreme Court, Disapproves the Proposed Law

By Associated Press Bedford Springs, Pa., June 27.– Lawyers laid the foundation of our constitutional republic and they must preserve it as the last and greatest outcome of Christian phil-osophy applied to the government declared Walter G. 




