

### ANTI-LOAFING BILL REGARDED AS FARCICAL

#### Justice Simpson, State Supreme Court, Disapproves the Proposed Law

Bedford Springs, Pa., June 27.—Lawyers laid the foundation of our constitutional republic and they must preserve it as the last and greatest outcome of Christian philosophy applied to the government, declared Walter G. Smith, of Philadelphia, in an address on "The American Bar Association," delivered last night before the Pennsylvania Bar Association. Mr. Smith spoke of the work of the national body in bringing about uniformity in the laws of the several states and in promoting a high standard of legal education.

The convention will close to-night with a banquet, during which Judge William H. Staake, of Philadelphia, the retiring president, will be toastmaster. Delegates last night expressed the opinion that W. I. Shaffer, of Chester, Delaware county, will be elevated to the presidency. Most of the session yesterday was devoted to discussion of the proposed anti-loafing bill. W. I. Shaffer, of Delaware county, and Judge Simpson, newly-appointed member of the Supreme Court, opposed the measure. Munson Wilson, of Williamsport, supported the bill, declaring shortage of manpower made it essential. The proposed law is regarded as a farce by Justice Simpson, newly-appointed member of the Supreme Court, who said that although the bill was intended to be a war measure, it would be entirely impracticable after the war. He asserted that many soldiers returning to their homes would discover their former positions filled and being without employment, would be subject to the penalty prescribed. "Lawyers were considered unnecessary at one time," Justice Simpson explained, "and the same conditions may arise again." He told the delegates that even the Supreme Court might be considered unnecessary and the judges of that court would naturally fall under the provisions of the law.

### RAILROAD RUMBLES

#### Baltimore and Ohio Issues Notes to Meet Big Debts

Baltimore, Md., June 27.—The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has sold to Kuhn, Loeb & Co., and Speyer & Co. an issue of \$10,500,000 6 per cent. notes running for three months. It is understood that the proceeds from the transaction are to be utilized in meeting \$7,500,000 of one-year notes which mature July 1 and other corporate needs. These maturing obligations are a part of a total of \$15,000,000 issued last year, the notes maturing now having been for only one year and the remainder running two years.

Coincident with this new financing comes the news that the Ohio Public Utilities Commission has approved the application of the Baltimore and Ohio to issue \$20,000,000 of its refunding general mortgage bonds.

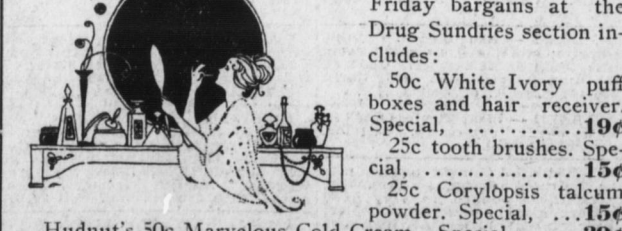
