

VETERANS WILL RETIRE SUNDAY

Expert Cabinet Worker Hails From Cumberland Valley; Is Known Here

One of four veterans of the Pennsylvania who will retire from service on July 1 is George Washington Cramer, a cabinetmaker.

Mr. Cramer worked in the Pennsylvania shops at Altoona for thirty-six years. He was born May 13, 1850. He entered the Pennsylvania navy on February 12, 1850, at Altoona in the glue-room of the cabinet shop under Foreman John Burley.

During February of this year Mr. Cramer was taken ill with pneumonia and, owing to ill health, has been compelled to relinquish his duties. The veteran is an expert craftsman on inlaid woodwork, he having formerly done most of the finer work on the wooden-style passenger cars put out by the Pennsylvania.

Mr. and Mrs. Cramer are planning to make their future home in Tyrone. Other shoppers who will retire are John B. Keller, William K. Hetrick and William H. Stewart.

Credit University is to Be Organized After War

Chicago.—Plans have been outlined for a national university of Credit Men's convention at the Hotel National Institute of Credit, at the session of the National Association of Credit Men's convention at the Hotel La Salle. It will be patterned after the American Institution of Banking and degrees will be conferred by universities upon the completion of a regular curriculum.

The project is an outgrowth of the war and is a step forward in line with preparations being made to meet world-wide competition following the declaration of peace. The preliminary course has been worked out by an advisory committee, consisting of Dr. J. T. Holdsworth, dean of the School of Economics, University of Pittsburgh; Dr. C. W. Gerstberg, director of the department of finance, New York University School of Commerce, Accounts and Finance, and Dr. W. L. Lord, dean of the School of Business Administration, Boston University.

MANSIONS SOLD The sale of one of Harrisburg's landmarks, the mansion of Mrs. North Front street, was completed yesterday by Mrs. Sarah M. Etter to Arthur F. Nelson, departmental superintendent of the Station plant of the Bethlehem Steel Company, for a consideration said to have been \$24,000. Nelson sold his present home, the old Hildrup mansion, Nineteenth and Nelson streets, to Al K. Thomas, cashier of the East End Bank, for a sum estimated to have been \$30,000.

It is said that he committed the thefts with the help of another man. The shirts were found in his room.

INDUSTRIES MUST FILE QUESTIONNAIRES The United States Fuel Administration, through its distribution agencies, is requesting a prompt reply to the fuel questionnaires, which are being sent to every industrial establishment which uses more than 500 tons of coal annually. The questionnaires

will furnish information to the Board of the Fuel Administration as to which industries are essential and should receive coal first.

RIVER COAL POOR River coal now being taken from the Susquehanna bottom is not up to the standard of former years, operators say. The largely increased number of dredges on the river lead operators to predict that the supply will be greatly diminished and probably exhausted by the end of this season. Much of the coal formerly washed down the river is now salvaged at the mines.

CONSIDER INCREASE IN COAL PRICES The price of coal, which will be increased because of the increase in freight rates, is now being determined by the local Fuel Administration. Householders who order coal at the old rates but have not yet received it must pay the increased price when it is delivered. Dealers will not be allowed to add the increased freight rates to their coal prices when delivering the coal already in their yards.
