

SHRINERS JOIN DRY MOVEMENT

Action of Imperial Council in Annual Meeting Significant

Boston, Mass. — Significant and marking unmistakably the trend of the times toward complete prohibition, is held to be the action of the Imperial Council of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine in recommending to the 145 subordinate temples in the United States that intoxicants be barred hereafter from buildings where ceremonial sessions are held.

Apparently there was but little if any real debate on the resolution offered in the sessions of the Imperial Council some days ago, in Atlantic City, N. J., when it was proposed that the subordinate temples be advised to do away with intoxicating drinks at their regular high meetings.

The Recorder said that the recommendation of the Imperial Council in favor of doing away with intoxicants will be forwarded to all of the councils in the United States. The Shrine, as a purely social organization of Masons, held that they could not afford to be behind hand in this great moral movement that is fast becoming country-wide.

TORPEDO SIGNALS ON TRANSPORTS

Detection Device Adopted by the Navy Is of Proved Value

New York.—A torpedo detection device that is of proved value has been adopted by the navy, says the Brooklyn Eagle, and is not only being installed upon all warships, but also upon all transports and merchant craft that operate in the submarine danger zone, which has now come to embrace practically all of the North Atlantic Ocean.

It is well known that German submarine commanders, as a result of much experience, have become highly expert in determining the character of a vessel merely by the sound of her screws. With their underwater ears alert, they can tell whether it is a passenger steamer in the vicinity of a destroyer.

The German commanders have become expert in making these calculations. If the victim stops or changes her course after the torpedo has been launched, then the target will not be hit, because the ship will not arrive at the calculated point.

The new torpedo detector is designed to furnish the necessary warning when the easily-discernible sound of a torpedo is picked up there is one simple rule for the ship attacked. She must reverse her engines and swing sharply out of her course.
