Liverpool, June 28.—Liverpool is using every precaution to prevent the outbreak of any disease.

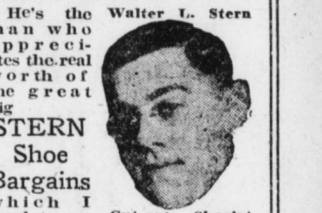
