Heer, of Oklahoma, Proves Himself Best Matchshot in the World

Seattle, Wash., June 29.—W. H. Heer, of Guthrie, Okla., defeated Frank M. Troeh, of Vancouver, Wash., in what will go down in the annals of trapshooting as one of the greatest matches ever shot.

The two stars shot at 500 targets each, and the final result was 473 breaks for Heer to 470 for Troeh.

The men were shooting for a purse of \$4000 in Liberty bonds, and side bets estimated to have been \$20,000 in Liberty bonds.

The race took place in connection with the thirty-fourth annual tournament of the Sportsmen's Association of the Northwest, held at Seattle, June 25, 24, 25.

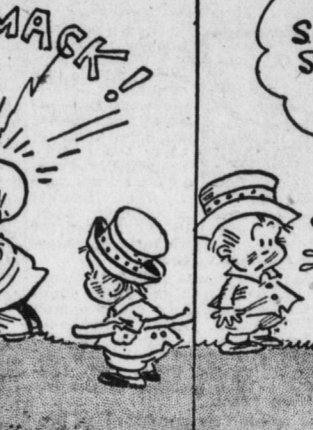
