The mule raised his hoof at the same time and for the same purpose with the result that Mr. Buohl got the serious harm was the biggest item of injury being the loss of the eggs. — Edgar P. Hamilton has left for Camp Greenleaf, Georgia, having been accepted in the Sanitary Corps of the Army. — William Kitzmiller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sandoe Kitzmiller, was accidentally shot in the foot at the home of his mother. ALLIES MAKE BIG GAINS ON HUN

Not only did the allies straighten out their lines, but they took from the German salients three important positions which were being used as jumping off points in future operations. Although the British attacked on a front of three and a half miles and the French on four and one-half miles, each effort was intended as a purely local operation to harass the enemy. In the north the British wiped out the Germans salients which would Nieppe forest northwest of Merville and that town now is menaced seriously. Three hamlets were retaken by the British. — The French captured three hundred prisoners. — Australian troops around Meriville, north of Merville, made a small gain and retaken three prisoners. — After this check on the Noyon-Montdidier front, the German Crown Prince made a strong attack south of the Aisne, but the British positions were taken from the Germans, whose lines were penetrated at several points to a depth of more than a mile. The French bag of prizes totals 1,000. Berlin reports the German troops as striving to check the Franco-British attack. Merville is the farthest point west the Germans reached in the Lyse battle, and the British gain there lessens the peril to Hazeubrouck. Not less satisfactory from the allied viewpoint is the successful French thrust south of the Aisne, which also relieved enemy pressure at a more or less vital point. — Airmen Are Busy The Germans show no intention of resuming the offensive, but it may be that the French and British strokes will spur them to action before the allied French thrust. Important positions between Ypres and Rheims. Except in Flanders and south of the Aisne, the western battle front is quiet. Intense aerial activity continues without a lull. The Germans repented their raids on Paris Friday for the third night in succession, but few bombs were dropped. In air fighting allied pilots have accounted for fifty-three enemy machines, while Berlin reports the shooting down of twenty-five enemy airplanes. French pilots are bombing military targets in Picardy and north of the Marne, and British bombers persist in their raids into the region about Metz. — Fighting activity on the Italian front is of minor character. Artillery duels have increased in vigor along the front. Some Austrian machine gun trenches on the Asiago plateau have been penetrated by British troops, who took prisoners.
