STORAGE FOODS **SHOW DECLINE**

More Pork, But Fewer Eggs and Other Articles in the State's Warehouses Paul Burns

Leroy Conrad Thomas Dennis Pennsylvania cold storage wareouses contained more pork on June William Dunbar 30 than in years and a larger quan-tity of beef than usual, but less poul-Ray Garber try and eggs according to a sum-mary of the cold storage plant re-Lester Hoy ports made by Dairy and Food Com-missioner James Foust. A statement issued on the reports says that they show 3,499.835 pounds of beef in storage as compared with 2,131,905 a year ago and 4,122,171 in March. There were 2,833,531 pounds of pork as compared with 1,540,729 pounds a year ago and 2,-545,104 pounds three months ago. The high price of eggs deterred many warehouses and agents from buying large lots and holding. There were oxly 13,328,360 dozens in storage June 30 as compared with 16,577,051 dozens last year; 15,475,440 dozens in 1916; 18,800,169 dozens in 1914. Three months ago there were only 188,150 dozens in storage, showing that the usual spring season has produced less storage eggs than other similar reasons. The decrease in poultry has also opened a anew condition for storage men. At the beginning of the month there were 1,1,040,485 pounds of poultry in storage compared to 4,337,963 pounds a year 4go. The poultry storage holdings are lower than they have been at any time since 1913."
