Killed Hun For Friend and One For Home Town

Waynesboro, Pa., July 13.—Charles R. Bickle, Company B, Twenty-eighth Infantry, American Expeditionary Force, and a former Waynesboro man, being the son of the late Mayor W. I. Bickle, in a letter to a friend at Hagerstown, tells how he killed three Germans in action in the drive of May 8 in France. He wrote: "I went over the top on May 8, and in so doing, I accounted for three Hunns. For the first one I said to myself, 'This one is for me'; for the next one I killed I said, 'this is for Jim,' meaning James Koliopolous, proprietor of the Maryland Hotel, Hagerstown, and the third one was for Hagerstown, where I enlisted. Bickle listed in May last year and left for France in September.
