Need Not Be a Big One

Washington, July 22.—To create a nucleus for the organization of a new Russian army it will not be necessary to send a large allied-American force into Siberia.

With the 60,000 Czecho-Slovaks now along the Trans-Siberian railroad an additional 50,000 men should be ample to furnish all necessary protection while economic assistance is being distributed in an effort to restore the morale of the people. This is the conviction of men in touch with the Russian situation and in position to speak with authority as to the real needs presented. The first thing that must be done, it was pointed out, is to go to the assistance of the Czecho-Slovaks by furnishing complete equipment and supplies for every man their commander can muster.
