Ukraine Gives Up Bessarabia Claim

Paris, July 26. — The Ukrainian government has announced official by that it abandons its claim to Bessarabia, says Bucharest despatch to the German press transmitted by the Zurich correspondent of the Matin. As a result diplomatic relations between Rumania and Ukraine have been resumed.

The peace treaty between the Central powers and Rumania cedes Bessarabia to Rumania in return for Dobruja and other territory. Most of the inhabitants are Rumanian. The Ukraine borders Bessarabia of the north and east.
