

Lay Plans For College Army Training Corps

Washington, July 26.—Plans for establishing student army training corps in every college in the United States having a male enrollment of 100 or more were discussed at a conference between officials of the War Department and a group of college presidents, who have been appointed advisers to the department in their respective sections.
