It formerly was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry P. Davison. Mr. Davison is now head of the American Red Cross.

The information booths in New York City are located at every ferry, station, and junction point. For mothers who want to see their sons the plan is ideal. Take for instance

The woman came all the way from Scranton to the city. She had never been in New York and was much frightened. When her husband failed to met her she was just about ready to turn about and go home when a member of the Travelers' Aid Division of the "Y" accosted her and took her to the hostess house. Her husband was communicated with and she was taken to camp under the care of a chaperon. That's the sort of service that will be done.
