

SURVEY OF SUGAR IS BEGUN AMONG CITY CONSUMERS

Corn Product Being Used in Restaurants in Lieu of Cane Sugar

The Dauphin County Food Administration this morning began a survey of the amount of sugar in stock by registered commercial users of sugar.

The survey being made is to determine if sugar is being hoarded by retailers and users.

The sugar reports are now being mailed to the registered sugar users and must be returned until Monday, August 5.

Using Corn Sugar

The sugar reports now being mailed are to ascertain the total quantity on hand in stores of total quantity bought but not received.

Restaurants in the city which have felt the sugar shortage since they have been unable to secure usual quantities of sugar are rapidly adapting themselves to the use of substitutes.

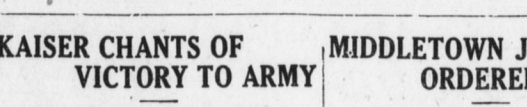
