Bates & Rodgers Construction Company, of Chicago, contractors for the grading, raidroad facilities, sewers, roads, water supply, steamheat and all concrete work at the New Cumberland quartermaster's depot development, have been awarded two contracts for war work which will run into many millions of dollars, at Panama City, Florida.
