

5TH WARD CASE IS GIVEN INTO HANDS OF JURY

Seven Defendants Accused of Political Thuggery Which Caused a Killing

West Chester, Aug. 14.—Philadelphia's Fifth ward case went to the jury today.

The trial, transferred here from Philadelphia on a change of venue asked by the defense, began July 15.

The defendants, charged with conspiracy to violate the Sherman law, prohibiting officeholders from participating in politics and to prevent a fair election are Isaac Deusch, a Fifth ward politician, who sought to take the leadership from James A. Carey; David Bennett, lieutenant of police of the Fifth ward and five policemen under Bennett.

Deusch and Carey were candidates for the Republican nomination for select council. Carey was a Penrose-McNichol man and Deusch made his campaign on the supposed backing of the Vares and the administration of Mayor Smith.

An attack on Carey's political club took place before the primary election last September, and thuggery by gunmen from New York led to the charges against the seven men just told.

Gunmen blackjacked Carey and Assistant District Attorney Maurer on primary election day. George Eppeley, a policeman on special duty in the ward to prevent disorder at the polls, went to the rescue of Carey and Maurer and was killed by a bullet fired by a gunman.

Mayor Smith, indicted with the others, obtained a severance.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Sunday work in shipyards is frowned upon by the Emergency Fleet Corporation, whose chief engineer, Howard Conroy, in an order issued to-day, stated that the management is strongly opposed to Sunday work. The order will result if the day is observed as a period of rest, and it therefore extends to all employees, including cases of emergency or to complete special or necessary work.

The order was issued for Sunday work, and it was charged that some of the men were staying off on week-ends and working on Sundays in order to get the higher rate of pay. This, it was said, led to the order issued to-day.

LEGAL NOTICES NOTICE The following ordinance was passed by the City Council and signed by the Mayor, and is published as directed by Article 6, Section 7, of the Act of Assembly approved March 1, D. 1913.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS AND THE PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Philadelphia, that it is hereby ordained by authority of the same, that for the purpose of this ordinance, the term "vehicle" shall mean any conveyance other than a street car or a baby carriage, used or intended to be used as a means of transportation on the public highways.

The term "highway" means any street, viaduct, bridge, or other place intended, used or set apart for public travel. This term shall include any street, viaduct, bridge, or other place intended, used or set apart for public travel, and the person who pushes, draws, or pulls a cart, or is in charge of a vehicle.

The term "parked" means a waiting vehicle which is standing, standing more than five minutes.

Section 2. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on any highway at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the character of the highway, the traffic, or so as to endanger property, or the life or limb of any person; but no person shall operate a motor vehicle at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in two and one-half minutes, except in the case of a motor vehicle which shall be operated at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in four minutes.

Section 3. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on any highway between the hours of eight o'clock A. M. and four o'clock P. M., no person shall operate a motor vehicle on any highway at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in two and one-half minutes, except in the case of a motor vehicle which shall be operated at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in four minutes.

Section 4. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on any highway at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in two and one-half minutes, except in the case of a motor vehicle which shall be operated at a rate of speed exceeding one mile in four minutes.
