

650 NAMES ON ONE OF WAR'S HEAVIEST LISTS

Many Pennsylvanians Killed, Wounded and Missing in Battle in France

Washington, Aug. 28.—Many Pennsylvanians appear in the three casualty lists containing 650 names, issued by the War Department to-day. On the two army lists there are 629 names and on the Marine Corps list appears twenty-one names.

A summary of the army casualties is appended: Killed in action 74, Missing in action 189, Wounded severely 248, Died of wounds 23, Died of aeroplane accident 1, Died from accident and other causes 6, Died of disease 12, Wounded (degree undetermined) 74.

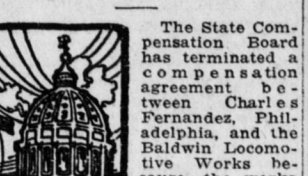

MACKEY RAKES NONESSENTIALS

Scores Men Who Try to Leave Industry to Go Into Small Cigar Store Business



The State Compensation Board has terminated a compensation agreement between Charles Fernandez, Philadelphia, and the Baldwin Locomotive Works because the works has given the man employment after an injury where he is making more money than before he was hurt, with some terse comments.

"This is a typical case against which we are on constant guard," says Chairman Harry A. Mackey. "Although somewhat maimed this man can always be useful in industry. We desire to discourage the thought in a workman that because he has been so unfortunate as to lose the partial use of a hand that he is justified thereby in forsaking a producing establishment and undertaking a nonessential business of his own."

Big Increases.—Notices of big increases in stocks or bonds have been filed with the Public Service Commission by a number of public utility companies. Among them are West Penn Power Company, Pittsburgh, bonds, \$2,225,000; the Wilkes-Barre Company, Wilkes-Barre, bonds, \$200,500; Metropolitan Edison Company, Reading, bonds, \$48,000; Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company, bonds, \$18,000; Pittsburgh and Shawmut Railroad Company, Kittanning, notes, \$500,000; the Ridgeway Electric Light Company, Ridgeway, bonds, \$300,000; common stock, \$105,000; St. Mary's Electric Light Company, bonds, \$100,000; common stock, \$225,000; Johnsonburg Light and Power Company, common stock, \$45,000; bonds, \$25,000; and the following by electric companies with offices at Bradford, Bradford electric, common stock, \$5,000; Bradford township, Foster township, Keating township, Lafayette township, Liberty township, Port Allegheny, Smithport, power companies, each \$500 of stock.

Boards Cautioned.—State draft headquarters has issued a caution to all local draft boards that competent and necessary medical examiners can not be released to enter the medical corps without permission of the state headquarters. This action was taken because of the notice from the provost marshal in general that military medical board members have been going into the Army, 106 having left the draft service during July in this manner. Local cards have also been directed to where any doubt exists as to the availability of a registrant rejected at a camp the matter should be taken up with the camp commander and have been reminded that reports on the "work or fight" order must be made to-day.

Big Test On.—An appeal to the Supreme Court from the order of the Public Service Commission, in its finding that the commission has the power to authorize increases of street passenger railway fares above the maximum rates prescribed by a municipal ordinance was filed by City Solicitor Bertelett, of Reading, yesterday. The appeal is on the question of franchises and will not supersede in any way the hearing to be held in Reading on August 29, when the question of the reasonableness of the six-cent fare will come before the commission.

Reappointments.—The following reappointments were announced at the Governor's office to-day: Valley Forge Park Commission, W. H. Sayen, John V. Jordan, John T. Windsor and John R. K. Scott, of Philadelphia; State Quarantine Board, J. L. Forwood, Chester.

Object to Charge.—Complaint against the "readiness to serve" charge of the Highland Gas Company, operating near Philadelphia, was filed to-day by customers before the Public Service Commission. A Shamokin firm attacked the system of freight charges for switching movements in vicinity of Shamokin and West Milton by the Philadelphia and Reading Railway. The

complaints were sent to the companies for answers. New Justice.—Paul R. Smith was appointed justice for the borough of Mount Alto. Rates Go Up.—The Center and Clearfield Railway Company, filed notice with the Public Service Commission that it had advanced rates for tickets and the Mattawana Peoples Mutual Telephone Company, of McVeytown, and vicinity gave notice of an increase in monthly rates. The Lackawanna Light, Duff City Gas and Diamond Light and Power Company, Pittsburgh, also filed new rates. Order Modified.—The Public Service Commission to-day issued an order modifying its order of last year for improvements to the water supply of the Galeton-Eldred Water

Company to permit "immediate relief" to the borough of Galeton. Opera Singer Gets 12 Pounds of Flour in Lieu of Salary

Berne.—With twelve pounds of flour for each appearance in lieu of money, the great singer Chaliapine has been engaged by the Moscow Grand Opera, according to an announcement made in the German newspapers. The contracting agreement calls for this "salary" for every time that Chaliapine sings.
