State Fishery Department Is Sending Many Fish to Repopulate Creeks in State

Larger trout than ever before, distributed as being sent out from the fish hatcheries of the state for distribution in the streams and all reports received this far show that the state has been fortunate in its mid-August shipments. In spite of the unusually early start of the distribution and weather and transportation conditions there appeared to be little trouble and fish reached destinations in good shape.

The early distribution was ordered because many of the Fishery department's experienced men are in the army and it is intended to fill the orders as far as possible. We will bend every effort to meet the requests for trout, said Commissioner Buller in talking about the matter.
