The Gas Defense Division now adviced the seeds to be used in making carbon for sugar and canning supplies, grocers have been requested by the food administrator to place a barrel in their stores for the public to throw their peachstones in. The fruit stones must be washed and dried by the public first, thus eliminating the possibility of unsanitary conditions.
