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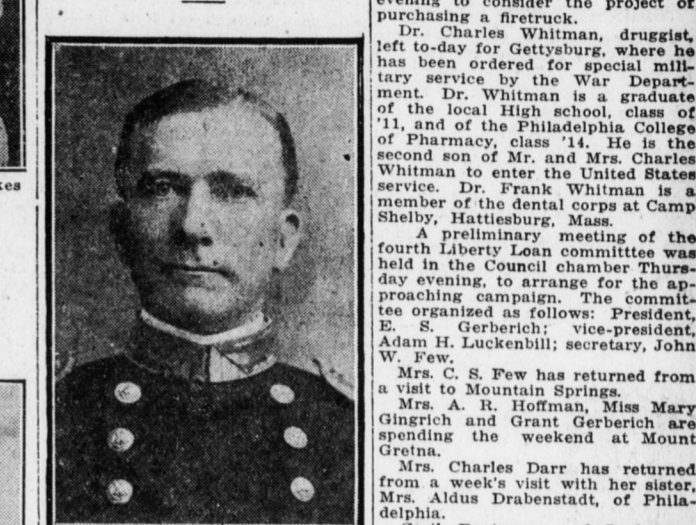
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TRANSPORT HIT BY HUN TORPEDO

Great Troop Ship Mangos to Get Back to Port After Attack



CAPTAIN D. F. DISMUKES, Harrisburg Naval Officer Whom Commanded III-Fated Transport

Washington, Sept. 7.—The United States steamship Mount Vernon, formerly the German liner Kron Prinzessin Cecilia, was torpedoed by a German submarine, 200 miles off the French coast, but was able to return to a French port on her own power, the Navy Department has announced.

Secretary Daniels said he had received a brief message from Vice-Admiral Sims, which did not give the extent of the damage to the vessel nor contain any mention of possible casualties. The Mount Vernon was able to make fourteen knots in returning to the French port, which indicated to navy officials the possibility that only one of her engines had been disabled by the torpedo.

This is the third of the troop transports which formerly were German liners which have been attacked in the motor, by the President Lincoln and the Covington, both of which were sunk.

Captain Douglas F. Dismukes, captain of the United States transport Mount Vernon, which was torpedoed yesterday by a U-boat, while en route from France, has arrived here, spending much of his time in the city while on leave.
