

veiller is one of the foremost authorities on housing in the country. He has made an intensive study of the industrial housing problem, especially with its relation to wartime industries, his most important contribution toward the solution of which is the Government Standards for Permanent Industrial Housing Developments, drafted by him and formally adopted by the Bureau of Industrial Housing and Transportation of the Department of Labor, to govern construction in Federal housing developments.

Mr. Veiller's acquaintance with the various phases of the housing problem comes from first-hand experience, extending over a period of more than twenty years.

is the author of the "Model Housing Law," on which most of the housing legislation in the country is based. He is the author also of "Housing Reform," the pioneer work on the subject in

His co-operation with the Real Estate Board and the Civic and Commerce Association of Minneapolis aided in placing on the statute books of Minnesota, within the past year, a housing law which will enable Minneapolis in the future to deal much more effectively with her housing problems. Housing, at this time, is one of Harrisburg's most serious problems. The question is one which deserves the earnest consideration of every citizen who has the welfare of the city at heart, and it is highly important that the members of the Chamber attend this meeting.
