Crews Move 23,000 Cars in 72 Hours

Moving a total of 23,516 carts within a seventy-two-hour period is a record of freight movement over the Middle Division since midnight, Saturday, and Sunday.

Delays in car movement are especially costly at this time, the division being unusually short on sufficient crews to handle the increased work and the layoff of members of the present force greatly cripples the movement.

Two Reported Ill Granted Clemency by State Board Late Last Night

The session of the board, one of the longest in months, was enlivened by the sharp criticisms of sentences imposed by Philadelphia judges on the part of Lieutenant Governor McClain and Secretary of the Commonwealth Woods.
