York, Sept. 24.—The August statement of earnings of the York Railway Company showed a reflection of the recent rise in fares to 16 cents. The gross earnings amounted to \$91,334, an increase of \$6,871, or 8.1 per cent, compared with the same month last year.

Railroad Stocks Respond to Director's Statement

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AMERICANS STOP GERMAN RAIDERS BY QUICK FIRE
