BRITISH TROOPS TRIUMPH IN WAR DRIVES OF DAY

Casualties of Great Proportions Inflicted on Enemy in St. Quentin Area

With the British Army in France, Oct. 2.—Yesterday was another day of victories for the fighting British army.

The day was an ideal one for flying, and the British aviators, who had not been busy for several days, again came into their own.

Once more casualties of great proportions have been inflicted on the Germans, who now are fighting with greatest desperation, realizing that their position in this entire area is now precarious than at any time during the past four years.

From here the battle line curves back northward, passing about 1,500 yards southwest of Gouey, which also has once been reached by the allied troops but at the present moment is in German hands.
