

TICONDEROGA HIT BY ENEMY U-BOAT; LOSS LIKELY BIG

Vessel Separated From Convoy Sinks After Attack by Enemy Submarine

An Atlantic port, Oct. 10.—News of the sinking by a submarine of a large American steamship, with the probable loss of many of her crew, was brought here today by a British freighter. The British ship had about twenty survivors of the American vessel.

The American steamship, said to have carried a large crew, was shelled and then torpedoed, according to officers of the rescue ship. The attack was made five days ago.
