Methodist Episcopal followers are delighted to report that the first consecration of a geococoon was in 1889. The Rev. Mr. Pierce, of Local Church, Named as District Director

The greatest evangelistic, spiritual program ever planned in the Baptist denomination is planned for the week of November 17-24, to be known as "Christian Enlistment Week." The program proposes a nation-wide campaign to be carried out under the leadership of the laymen.

The organization consists of a state committee made up of men of organizing ability and spiritual insight. Each state is divided into districts or associations and a director is placed at the head of each association to supervise the work as it relates to the local church.

At the same time the congregation will worship on the second floor of the Rutherford Heights Inn in a room that has been thoroughly fixed up for the purpose. A large number of families have already enrolled and over fifty children have enrolled in the Sunday school.

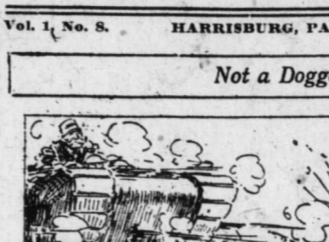
