Denmark Asks Germany to Observe Old Treaties

Amsterdam, Oct. 21—Denmark, according to news agency telegrams to the Dutch press, has sent a note to Germany suggesting that certain terms of the treaties executed between the two countries in the period from 1860 to 1870 should be carried out.

The Vaderland says the treaty of 1864, which ceded the dukedoms of Schleswig-Holstein and Laurenburg to Prussia, provided for a plebiscite in Schleswig to decide whether the inhabitants would prefer allegiance to Germany or to Denmark. This provision, it is declared, never has been carried out.
