

Colonel House long has made frequent trips to Europe since the war began in 1914, conferring with leaders in the leading belligerent nations. More than a year ago he was charged by the President with gathering data for use at the peace conference. Much of it has been assembled at the headquarters of the American Geographical Society in New York. 
