Ballots For Next Week's Elections Delivered to the County Commissioners

Official and specimen ballots for all the city and county polling places were delivered to-day to the office of the county commissioners by the printing company which was awarded the contract for this work.

On the ballot this year there are seven parties, listed in the following order: Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Prohibition, Washington, Fair Play, Single Tax.

Because of the unusual conditions due to the influenza epidemic, the county court will be petitioned to change the polling place for the Second Ward, First Precinct, Steelton, which is at the undertaking establishment of L. B. Helte, to an office of Wilt Brothers, 111 South Front street.

"Looks like a circus wagon," "Gotta Y. M. C. A. sign on it." "Aw, thick! It's one of those Y. M. C. A. signs."

It was a rolling canteen of the latest type, making its trial trip up behind the lines to serve soldiers coming out.

No One Has a Fixed Prop that prevents the canteen from tumbling over on its nose.

The whole front of the canteen's interior is divided into compartments for the storing of supplies.

Thousands of quarts of it are drunk daily. The supply seldom equals the demand.
