Certified Milk to Cost 24 Cents After Sunday

Beginning Sunday, the price of certified milk in Harrisburg will be twenty-four cents a quart instead of nineteen cents, the heretofore prevailing price in this vicinity. The decision to raise the price of certified milk was made at a recent meeting of the certified milk producers and the milk commission of the Harrisburg Academy of Medicine. Producers at this meeting stated that they could not maintain their present standards of production at the nineteen-cent rate so an increase to twenty-four cents was granted by the commission.

The price for certified milk has been as low as twelve cents a quart in normal times.
