

26 PENNA. MEN KILLED ON WAR FRONT IN FRANCE

1,083 Names on Lists Made
Public by Department
at Capital

Washington, Nov. 8.—Casualties among the American Expeditionary Forces announced to-day by the War Department total 1,083 names, one hundred and fifty-nine of whom were killed in action. Among the latter are 26 Pennsylvanians. The summary lists follow:

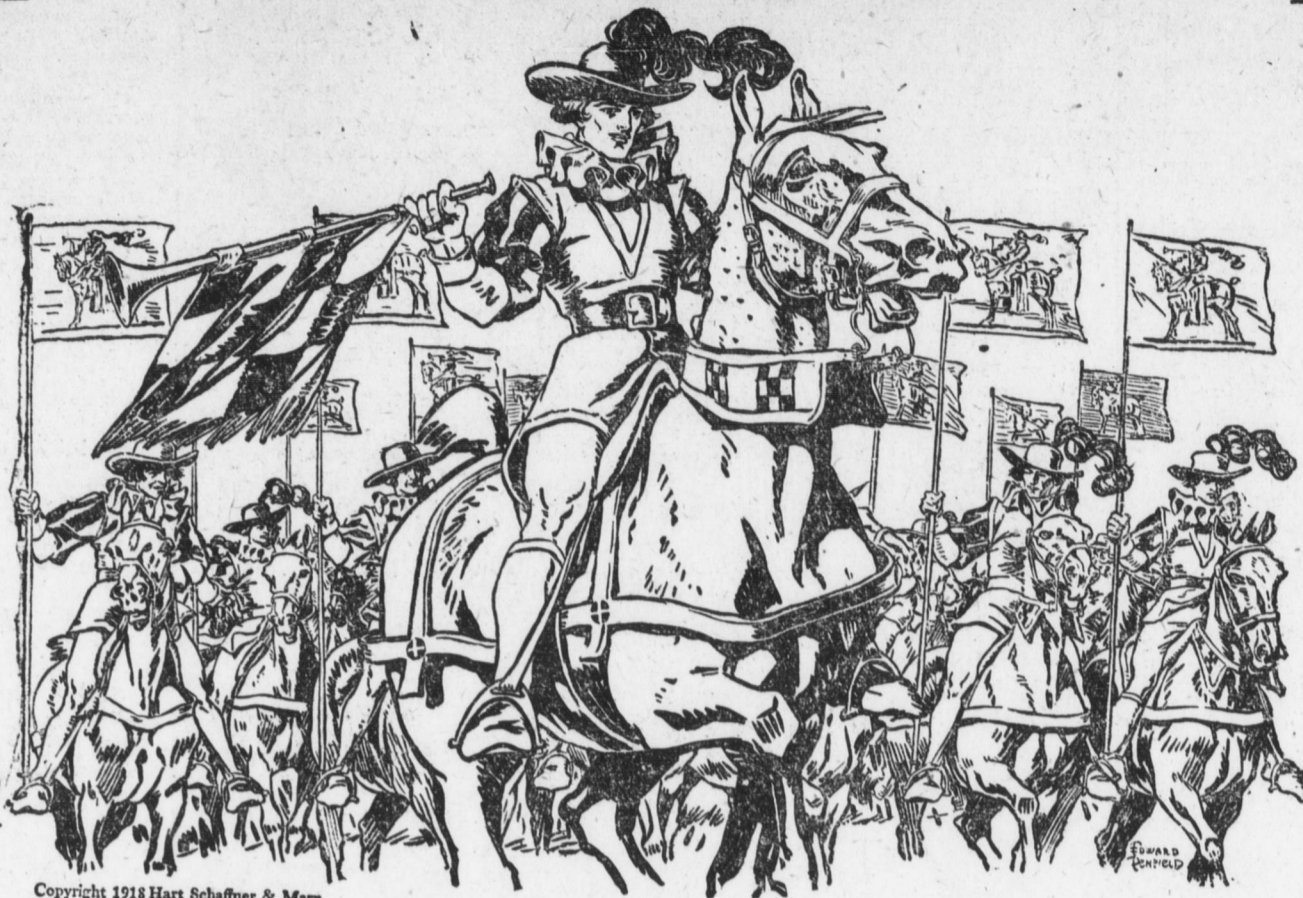
