

J. William Rickenbach Is Killed Under Car Draft

Slipping from a car which he was riding in the Enola yards yesterday, J. William Rickenbach, 612 Woodbine street, a brakeman on the Pennsylvania railroad, was killed when a short draft of cars passed over his body. Rickenbach was 38 years old and had been employed by the Pennsylvania for the past two years. He was a member of the Knights of Malta, Fountain Lodge of the Odd Fellows, No. 1129, and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. He was an active member of the North Harrisburg Mission of the United Evangelical Church. He leaves his wife, Mrs. Lillie Rickenbach, a daughter, Anna, fourteen years old, three brothers and three sisters. Funeral arrangements have yet been completed, pending word from his brothers in Ulrichs, South Dakota.

INFLUENZA MAY COME HERE AGAIN

Dr. Royer Warns People to Take Precautions Against Threatened Recurrence

The epidemic of influenza has already claimed more than 5,000 lives in the State of Pennsylvania alone. The State Department of Health declares that unless proper precautions are taken by the thousands of patients now recovering from the ravages of this disease there will be a large and gruesome addition to the death list and many patients who think they are on the road to recovery will suffer serious relapses which may rapidly develop into fatal cases of pneumonia.

In order that persons convalescing from influenza may be properly advised regarding the necessary care to be taken until full recovery is reached, Dr. B. Franklin Royer, acting commissioner of health, has issued the following statement: "One half million Pennsylvanians are now convalescing from influenza. All of them feel for a period of days or weeks the weakness and depression so commonly affecting the convalescent. Thousands of persons will have no physician during the period of recovery, hence a word of warning to them."

"From two to four days after the average person recovers from the influenza accompanying influenza getting up cautiously may be allowed. Getting up and going about often leads to dangerous collapse of the heart because of its inability, due to weakness, to go beyond the limit of the remote extremities. The heart muscle in most persons has been seriously damaged by the poison of influenza and the heart itself may suddenly dilate to a dangerous extent leading to fainting or sinking spells. To put undue strain through exercise or work upon a heart in such condition may lead to permanent damage to the heart itself. Further, a person in such a state of weakness or collapse very readily catches with pneumonia because of defective circulation and hundreds of persons getting up and going about too soon have thus brought additional pneumonia or heart disease upon themselves."

"Take warning therefore. Get up gradually, stop short of fatigue or on the slightest sign of weakness. Better lay up another week rather than attempt to go beyond the strength of a fagged heart. "For the same reason it is inadvisable to attempt buying up one's strength by over-stimulation. Dissipation of any sort, especially alcoholic dissipation, is dangerous for both heart, kidney and lung in this stage of convalescence. Simple nourishing food taken to the limit of one's digestive ability, rest and rest frequently in a reclining position, probably offers the best possible hope for complete recovery without permanent damage to vital organs."

STATE BANKS THE LOAN MAINSTAY

Commissioner Lafaen Issues Some Figures Showing What They Did For It

Reports made to State Banking Commissioner Daniel F. Lafaen, by 509 of 542 state chartered banks, trust companies and saving institutions under supervision of the state government, show that they over-subscribed their quotas of the Fourth Liberty Loan by more than \$55,000,000.

The total quota for these institutions was \$289,271,562.43. They officially report subscriptions of \$344,880,892, or what is calculated as "a net over-subscription of \$55,609,321.41." Of the institutions 106 were short in their quotas and 403 exceeded their quotas. There were 32,825 subscribers.

ACCIDENT GETS A DEFINITION

Interesting Rulings Made by the State Compensation Board on Claims

A miner who hurts himself in an effort to shut off the current from a mining machine when a cable slips in order to prevent an accident or replace a part of the appliance is held to be entitled to compensation by the State Compensation Board in deciding Ferrari vs. Ferwut Mining Company. It is held to be "an untoward event which is not expected."

In Bailey vs. Pennsylvania Coal and Coke Corporation it is held that a wife who had sued for divorce and for whom a master in the application had recommended a divorce, but wherein a final decree had not been signed, is entitled to compensation for death of the husband and that the parents of the deceased are not entitled to the sole award. In this case the wife had not been supported by the decedent, but he was contributing to support of his parents.

In the decision in Knauft vs. Schantz, a Williamsport case, it is held that compensation should continue to be paid because the injured man is still disabled and has not been offered work by his employer that he could do.

Price of Milk To Advance Nov. 11th

This action has been approved by the Pennsylvania Food Administrator through its Representative, Dr. Clyde L. King, and is deemed necessary because of the increased cost of production and distribution.

On and after November 11th, 1918, the retail price of milk will be 13 cents per quart and 7 cents per pint. The price to the grocery stores will be 13 cents per quart and 7 cents per pint, they to have the privilege of charging whatever additional is reasonable to compensate them for the cost of handling.

As a war measure, during the Winter months, milk will be delivered only in daylight, starting at seven o'clock instead of three and four o'clock, and be served double on Saturday, as there will be no delivery on Sunday.
