

#### No Halt of Draft in Armistice Talk

Washington, Nov. 9 .- Secretary of War Baker yesterday authorized the statement that negotiations for an armistice in France have not cause the War Department to check in any way the machinery of the draft law, and that no contracts for supplies or equipment have been canceled because of the probability of Germany's accepting the terms received yesterday morning from Marshal Foch.

Until Germany actually signs the armistice, no slackening of the war machinery of the United States is to be permitted, however far advanced may be the program of action to follow the German capitulation.

#### 405,000 Taken by Allies in West Since January

London, Nov. 9.—Two hundred thousand prisoners were taken by the British on the western front from January 1 to November 5, inclusive, according to an official announcement made in the House of Commons. In the same period the French captured 140,000, the Americans 50,000 and the Belgians 15,000.
