Schwab Glad He Had Part in Bringing War to End; Lauds the Yankee Toiler

Boston, Nov. 15.—Hailed as the man who built the bridge of ships to Pershing, Charles M. Schwab, general manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, told the City Club last night of his happiness as an American citizen in assisting in bringing the war to a victorious conclusion.

"The rearrangement and readjustment of social and industrial enterprises that will tax the resources of the American government for years to come, is just ahead," he declared. "To meet the situation he urged that democracy not only must be preached but must be practiced."

He affirmed his belief in the American working man. "I never expect to see the red flag of anarchy in this country," he added. "I believe in telling the working man what the red flag means. I am not a Socialist. I believe in every man having the reward of his labor, but the real reward, to my way of thinking, is the reward that comes to every man, in his heart, in the thought of duty well performed."
