

BIG HEARINGS TO START VERY SOON

Public Service Commission Arranges For Sitings in Half a Dozen Cities



The Public Service Commission has arranged to hold hearings on the remainder of the month in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Scranton, Pottsville, Wilkes-Barre, Allentown and Harrisburg to clear the dockets of cases which have accumulated owing to the interruption of hearings by the influenza quarantine and the filing of new complaints. In addition to the complaints, applications for approval of various matters will be acted upon. The hearing on the "coal clause" in contracts for electric current, in which many electric companies are interested, will be held here on November 26.

The Philadelphia dates are being made up. Pittsburgh will have hearings November 21 and 22, 26 and 27 and December 4 and 5; Pottsville, November 26; Johnstown, November 22, Allentown, November 22 and 26; Scranton, November 21; Wilkes-Barre, November 26 and 27.

Many Alien Claims.—The State Workmen's Compensation Board has listed 211 claims brought by A. Mitchell Palmer, custodian of alien property, in behalf of dependants of Austro-Hungarian workmen who were hurt or killed in Pennsylvania industrial accidents since the war began. The cases involve over half a million dollars in claims. The list includes nine at Philadelphia, twenty-four at Pittsburgh, twenty-eight at Pottsville, twenty-seven at Scranton, six at Lancaster, six at Williamsport, twelve at Kane and twenty-nine at Altoona.

Plan Great Bridge.—The plans for the Delaware river bridge are being made and it is now the idea to have it start in Washington Square. Governor-elect Sprout is interested and will help the government to unite with the state.

Interest in Williams.—Capitol Hill is taking a big interest in the boom for George W. Williams, of Tioga, for speaker. Mr. Williams is well and favorably known at the Capitol because of long service.

Visiting Roads.—The engineers of the State Highway Department have covered a couple of hundreds of miles of main highways the last few days in the inspection of maintenance work. The Lincoln highway was toured for considerable stretches.

State Chairman Here.—State Chairman William E. Crow came here from Uniontown for a brief visit. He left for Philadelphia this morning.

Local Cases Listed.—The complaint against the Harrisburg Railways Company has been listed for the week of December 9 when it is planned to complete the testimony. The Valley

Railways base is off until the middle of January.
