Saturday, November 9 The Lykens-Wiconaco district is the first over the top in the United War Work Fund drive, subscribing \$4,500 for the soldiers in France.

Two hundred and eighty-eight men are called to go to camp next week because of proximity of peace. City Council asked to secure bids for collection of ashes this winter.
