

SWEETS PLENTY FOR CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY SEASON

Tasty Nut Concoctions Made Up For the Sugar Shortages

Just how much Christmas joy will be taken out of the holiday season this year was estimated variously by confectioners and candy manufacturers of the city to-day.

One retailer made very clear the manufacturers' attitude toward candies containing a large percentage of sugar, such as chocolate creams, jellies and gum goods, have necessarily been cut down.

On the other hand, it was pointed out, candies containing fruit assortments and nuts and pecans are being manufactured in large quantities.

Another consequence of the shortage, manufacturers are limiting the supply of candies in bulk, and producing more in package form.

Again, many chocolate goods are being supplied to army training camps and forces abroad.

Although the sugar situation has been severe to candy manufacturers, these conditions should not last long, said this retailer.

RAILROAD IDLERS TO BE SPURRED TO WORK

Railroad men are to be stopped from laying off for trivial reasons. This is the word that has gone out at Altoona by William A. Blackman, returning Director General McAdoo, who expressed his amazement when reports show an intolerable condition which must be remedied at once.

Near Mapleton while train No. 608 over the "Penny main line" was passing and the water on the "Fly," brakeman Charles Glines, twenty-four, of Altoona, was struck by water splashing from the trough.

For the first time since its inception women will be admitted to the railway mail service. On account of the rigorous nerve-racking duties required in postal cars, it is said, according to instructions sent out by the post office, that women who enter this branch of Uncle Sam's postal system will not be employed on the road but will be assigned to the office jobs and work at the large terminals.

Extra fare now charged on a few fast trains between New York and Chicago, New York and Washington, and elsewhere, may be eliminated by the railroad administration. Director General McAdoo is considering removing these special charges, it was said, although action may not be taken for a week or more.

Fireman Vocem of the Middle division freight service, paid an involuntary visit to Lewistown Junction yesterday afternoon when a passenger train heading from Harrisburg on train No. 3 and falling asleep failed to get off at his own home town 12 miles east of Lewistown.

Effective Monday, November 18, a slight increase is to be made in the rates covering shipment of packages and marketing in baggage cars on passenger trains, in the Philadelphia suburban territory operated by the lines of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the Philadelphia and Reading Railway Company.

Washington. — In answer to appeals for the waiving of demurrage on municipal holidays for victory celebrations, the Railroad Administration explained to-day demurrage may be suspended only on recognized national and state holidays.

Street Foreman Falls Dead While Directing Asphalt Paving Gang

Charles W. Hartwick, 113 Conoy street, foreman of the asphalt gang repairing the street near Sixteenth and Market streets, was suddenly stricken with what is believed to be heart disease early this morning. He was taken to the Harrisburg Hospital and died enroute.

Hartwick rode to the scene of the repair work on a bicycle early this morning, arriving there about 7 o'clock. Bystanders say that he stepped off the bicycle and after walking a few steps, fell to the ground. On the way to the hospital he died. Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

LAST FLASHES OFF THE WIRE

Paris. — German officers, guilty of having ordered or of having themselves committed shocking crimes in Lille and the region of the North, are to be tried by court-martial.

Basel. — The Galician leader, Dzyznaki, has been appointed Premier of Poland and charged with the formation of a cabinet.

Basel. — Prince Adolphe of Schaumburg-Lippe, has renounced his throne for himself and family, says a dispatch from Bueckeberg.

New York. — Since the United States entered the war, thirty-three Y. M. C. A. workers, twenty-nine men and four women, have given up their lives in service abroad. Of this number nineteen were killed and fourteen died of disease or by accident.

Washington. — Secretary Baker has planned to stop all movement of additional troops to Europe with the exception of surgical units. Senators were told to-day at their weekly conference with the War Department officials.

Chambersburg. — The Rev. T. Bahn Thomas, pastor of Second Lutheran Church, sent his resignation from New York and urged its early acceptance, he made up his mind at the Lutheran merger meeting to accept a position as Y. M. C. A. worker.

Washington. — The Treasury to-day extended a credit of \$7,000,000 to the Czechoslovak National Council. Great Britain to-day was given a new credit of \$200,000,000. Italy, \$50,000,000, and Belgium, \$2,000,000.

Savannah, Ga. — The frame for a 2,500-ton vessel has been laid in three days in the yard here of the Terry Shipbuilding Corporation. Officials said the vessel to be planned in twenty days and launched in thirty days from the time the keel is laid.

Paris. — French and American troops continued to progress in their occupation of Alsace-Lorraine. Both forces continued their movements in the direction of Metz to-day, according to the Temps.

WILHELM GIVES UP HIS SWORD

Advices from Amerongen, Holland, say the former emperor has not been interned by the Netherlands government, being regarded by it as a distinguished foreigner who has sought refuge in Holland and has a claim to protection. He, therefore, is presumably free to go where he likes, but the fact that his suite actually has been interned restricts his movements.
