GERMAN FANGS STILL PROTRUDE

London, Nov. 20.—Germany in the end have way, not because she had changed her views, but because she knew she was absolutely beaten, declared the Earl of Reading in a speech in London to-day.

Bying low when attacked by six Powers and forced to land within the enemy lines.

There is sufficient food in Belgium for five weeks, according to Fernand Baetens, of the American commission of relief in Belgium.

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"HEX" DOCTOR CONVICTED OF SERIOUS CHARGE

Chambersburg, Pa., Nov. 20.—John H. Keckler, of Waynesburg, was convicted this morning of "hex-doctoring," "witches' incantations" and various "ghostly matters" mingled in a trial, the weirdest coming before the county courts in recent years.

Witnesses attested that Keckler came to the home of Harry Kriner, of Lemasters, pointing out to him that his farm was enchanted by witches.

Grace Kriner was 17 years old on April 19, 1917. Ada Grace was born Jan. 10, 1907. Miss Grace married August 2, 1917. She stated in her testimony that she and Keckler visited the Heckman home a half dozen times in 1915 and 1916 while Keckler was there, spending the night with him.
