D., 1918, she wrote a certain article which appeared in the Harrisburg Telegraph, an injurious article affecting Dr. J. E. T. Oxley, of this city and Miss Idella Fisher, of Steelton, a teacher in the schools of the borough. Dependent now she avers, declares and sets forth that the said statement was absolutely and maliciously false; that it was prompted by jealousy, for which feeling no action on the part of Dr. Oxley or Miss Fisher toward her was responsible. She hereby retracts the said injurious statement, and before me made by her and expresses her deep sorrow, sincere regrets and apologies to both Dr. Oxley and Miss Fisher for the pain and anguish such statement has caused them, and that the statement was never made. And further the deponent said not."

There is no question but that turkeys will be high enough, yet it can hardly be said that there will be a scarcity here. Someone has suggested that in case prices soar too high, the boycott scheme which was tried last year with success, be repeated this year. Yet retailers in the city to-day said they do not believe this will be necessary, and that prices will, in general, be governed by the law of supply and demand. But just now, it seems, poultry producers are trying to anticipate a good thing, with the result that the market is unstable.
