

LONDON FEARS BOND BETWEEN BOLSHEVIK AND DEFEATED HUNS

Ukrainian Government Is Overturned; Troops From Astrakhan Capture Kiev; Denikine Leads Soviet Forces; Erzberger to Lead in Peace Negotiations

London sees a close alliance between Bolshevism and Germany. Sir George Cave asserted yesterday he had seen evidence of it during the last week. He said that although there is a pause in hostilities the enemy's activities have not ceased. "Germany already has begun to try to destroy the unity of the Allies and our unity at home," he stated.

It is announced in a Basel dispatch that Mathias Erzberger, who was at the head of the delegates sent to Marshal Foch's headquarters to sign the armistice, has agreed, at the request of the German government, to continue the negotiations relative to the armistice to prepare for those of peace.

A dispatch from Copenhagen tells of the overturning of the Ukrainian government and the capture of Kiev by troops from Astrakhan. The Ukrainian national assembly has fled and provisional government has been established by the capture of the city, who, apparently, are commanded by General Denikine, leader of the anti-Bolshevist forces.

RED CROSS TO HOLD MEETING Annual Business Session to Be Held at Chapter House

The annual meeting of the Steelton Chapter of the American Red Cross, which will be held to-night at 8 o'clock in the chapter house in Harrisburg street, will be the occasion for transacting much important business. Officers for the coming year are to be elected, plans for furnishing large supplies for war sufferers must be laid, and the reports for all the work of the chapter during the past year will be submitted at the meeting.

The most interesting report, perhaps, will be the one on the establishment and operation of the emergency hospital during the influenza epidemic, where excellent work was done in the care of the sick of the town. The plans for furnishing garments and supplies for war sufferers in large quantities will be gone over at to-night's meeting, and some arrangements made to undertake this work at the earliest possible date.

The headquarters in Harrisburg street will be open for public inspection to-night. Many interesting articles will be on exhibition which have been made in connection with war work. The exhibition will include a large number of articles made by the chapter for soldiers at the front. It is urged that all members of the local chapter attend the meeting to-night.

RED CROSS ACTIVE WITH HOLIDAY PARCELS

Announcement was made at the Red Cross headquarters in Harrisburg street, that relatives of soldiers abroad can secure cartons for Christmas packages without having labels, as was formerly necessary. If the rooms of the Red Cross Chapter should not be open at the time anyone calling for cartons, they can be secured at 356 Pine street. Such packages must be sent by November 30.

NEW AMBULANCE ARRIVES

The new ambulance for the Bethlehem Steel Company has arrived and will be put into service in a short time. The ambulance contains four stretchers and its style is along army lines.

TO HOLD FESTIVAL

Announcement has been made that the High school festival, an annual event of much interest, will be held December 6, in Felton Hall. The festival was to have been held at an earlier date, but the influenza closing order made this impossible. The proceeds of the festival will be used by the school for athletics.

Helped New Jersey Raise Its War Fund Quota

Alfred Franklin Hoffmeyer, of Old Orchard, has just returned from New Jersey, where for the past month he has been directing the United War Work Campaign. New Jersey was asked to provide \$25,000,000 of the \$170,000,000 fund, and he greatly over-subscribed its quota. This is the third consecutive war work campaign which Mr. Hoffmeyer has directed in New Jersey, and with its successful consummation he closes a period of over twelve years in service of this character, which has been rendered in practically all parts of the United States for hospitals, colleges, Y. M. C. A. and other similar organizations.

The Mary Sachs Shop, to which was awarded the contract for new uniforms and hats for Motor Messenger Corps of the local chapter of the Red Cross, has been putting forth extra efforts to have them completed by to-morrow. "WORLD RELIEF WEEK" PLANNED FOR DECEMBER

Special Program Arranged to Show Need of Food Conservation

"World Relief Week" will be observed nationally during the week beginning December 1. It will be observed in Harrisburg churches and Sunday schools and public schools through the efforts of the Dauphin County Food Administration. The week originally was named as Conservation Week, and has been arranged by the Federal food administration to impress Americans with the necessity of saving food even though the war has ended. Churches, Sunday schools, and public schools will receive special articles prepared by Herbert Hoover, which they will read into their regular programs. The church congregations will hear the articles through their pastors, who will be requested to read them Sunday morning, December 1.

Special exercises are to be arranged by the schools for the Friday following. The local administrator is preparing for the observance of the program here.

Plan Conference

Special window cards for store and shop windows were received in Harrisburg this morning, to be used during the week preceding Thanksgiving, and World Relief Week. They bear the captions "Don't Stop Saving Food," "Don't Let Up," and "Eat Less."

At a conference of county food administrators and their assistants in Philadelphia, Friday, with Howard

Hains, state food administrator, plans for the continued important activities of the food administration will be outlined. Frank Cook, assistant to Donald McCormick, county food administrator, and Mrs. John C. Jessup, Jr., director of the Women's division of the Dauphin County Food Administration, will accompany Mr. McCormick to the conference.

The Dauphin county food administrator has been advised that the current fair price schedules on flour and feed will continue in force without any change, for some time at least. It has been further decided that the regulation concerning the making of only one grade of flour also will be continued. The notice of the regulations was received at the Dauphin County Food Administration today.
