American Army of Occupation, Nov. 21.—The Americans had another triumphal day Wednesday in the forward march of the army of occupation.

Crossing the old German frontier of 1914 into Lorraine and swinging northward into the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg the Americans were enthusiastically received everywhere.

Swinging northward from Metz the American first division crossed into Luxembourg just before noon yesterday, entering Esch, a mining town of 20,000 inhabitants.

Pictures of President Displayed In the store windows and public buildings along the principal streets there were pictures of President Wilson, drawn by an artist of Esch, who had worked night and day to complete by hand as many drawings as possible.

Children Toss Flowers Two hundred pupils, attired in fancy dress, those of the girls being of the colors of France, and boys carrying the red and yellow colors of Lorraine, a home-made American flag and tri-colored bunting of France, met the troops at the archway over the route.

GREAT YANKEE ARMY IN FRANCE AT WAR'S CLOSE

Vast Mountains of Supplies Backed America's Fighting Men 53,000 MOTOR VEHICLES Nearly 2,000,000 Officers and Men on French Soil

American Headquarters in France, Nov. 21.—The extent of America's military effort in France at the time the armistice was declared is shown by statistics which the Associated Press is now permitted to make public.

On the morning of November 11, the United States had in France 78,321 officers and 1,881,376 men, a total of almost 2,000,000. There were 750,000 combat troops in the Argonne action, exclusive of the American units engaged elsewhere.

GERMANY'S ONCE MIGHTY HIGH SEAS FLEET STRIKES ITS FLAG AND SURRENDERS

28th Is Praised

Philadelphia, Nov. 21.—A fine tribute was paid to the Twenty-eighth Division of the American army, once the National Guard of Pennsylvania, by Secretary of War Baker, passing through this city to-day on his way to Camp Dix, Wrightstown, N. J.

"The Twenty-eighth division performed valiant service and proved itself a splendid division," said the secretary, and General Peyton C. March, chief of staff, who was with him nodded his approval.

YANKEE BATTLE FLEET SEES ENEMY QUIT SEA

Passing of Germany as a Naval Power Witnessed by Greatest Armada Ever Assembled in the History of the World

Washington, Nov. 21.—An American battle squadron, probably including five dreadnaughts commanded by Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman and operating as a unit of the British grand fleet, participated to-day in the passing of German sea power.

London, Nov. 21.—The British grand fleet, accompanied by an American battle squadron and French cruisers, steamed out at 3 o'clock this morning from its Scottish base to accept the surrender of the German battleships, battle cruisers and destroyers.

THREE CLAIM TITLE AS KING OF JERUSALEM

WASHINGTON—The present session of Congress will adjourn sine die at 5 o'clock this afternoon. After passage by the House of the adjournment resolution, the Senate approved it by a record vote of 41 to 13.

Terms of Armistice Carried Out by Defeated Foe

RENDEVOUZ OFF FIRTH OF FORTH

Ships Specified in Agreement Are Handed Over

London, Nov. 21.—The German fleet, as specified in the terms of the armistice with Germany, was surrendered to-day to the Allies.

This announcement was made officially by the Admiralty this afternoon. The statement read: Transfer at 9.30

STEIGER NAMED RECEIVER

Harrisburg—Henry I. Steiger was appointed by the court this afternoon as receiver of the Pennsylvania Reduction Company. It was stated in the petition that the company is insolvent and the company joined in asking the appointment. A bond of \$10,000 will be required from the receiver.

WATSON ATTACKS CABLE SEIZURE

Washington—Senator Watson, of Indiana, Republican, in a speech attacking the President for taking over cable and express lines, suggested that the cables were taken to suppress news of what is discussed at the peace conference.

WASHINGTON—Proceedings before the Senate Elections Committee contesting the election of Truman H. Newberry, Republican, as senator from Michigan, were ordered dismissed to-day by the committee, on a vote of six to five.

WEST CHESTER FIRE

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
